

Add a Prepositional Phrase to an Adjective Phrase

Some prepositional phrases work as adjectives.

Example: The dog in that yard belongs to Bill.

The phrase *in that yard* is a prepositional phrase that describes *dog*.

Add to each sentence below a prepositional phrase that works as an adjective. Underline the word that the added phrase modifies.

Example: The clown was funny.

The clown in the circus was funny.

1. The man bought a car.

2. The choir sang a song.

3. The children played a game.

4. The farmer fed his cow.

5. The snow covered the road.

6. The woman sat in the chair.

7. A cowboy rode the horse.

8. That clock belonged to the old man.

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1. The man bought a car.

Examples of correct answers:

The man bought a car with a white top.

2. The choir sang a song.

The choir from her church sang a song.

3. The children played a game.

The children in the class played a game.

4. The farmer fed his cow.

The farmer up the road fed his cow.

5. The snow covered the road.

The snow in January covered the road.

6. The woman sat in the chair.

The woman sat in the chair by the door.

7. A cowboy rode the horse.

A cowboy from Arizona rode the horse.

8. That clock belonged to the old man.

That clock on the wall belonged to the old man.
